



Public Benefit Grants Awareness Grants



Awareness Grants

Goal:

Expand conservation awareness through community organizing, education, and advocacy with grass-roots approaches to local and regional land conservation issues.

Grant tiers:

- o \$10,000 <u>or</u>
- o \$25,000

Typically 5-8 grants per year



Public Benefit Grants

Goal:

Promote public use through recreation, community gardens, local agriculture, and community conservation education that are consistent with land conservation and sustainable use.

Grant tiers:

- o \$10,000 <u>or</u>
- o \$25,000

Typically 5-6 grants per year



Example Awareness Projects

- After school program providing atrisk, middle school youth with meaningful connections to nature
- Multimedia journalism initiative to focus on a specific land preservation system in North Carolina
- Community engagement project to build awareness and ownership around a public trail

Example Public Benefit Projects

- Install an outdoor learning classroom and field work station at a public park
- Integrate education and stories about the past (historical interpretation) at a nature preserve
- Transform green space into a community space for a Latino neighborhood



Eligibility

- o Registered 501(c)(3) nonprofits are eligible. Governmental agencies, universities, religious congregations, and those operating under fiscal sponsorship of a 501(c)(3) are eligible when partnering with a nonprofit.
- Projects impact Chatham, Durham, Orange, and or/ Wake
 Counties
- Comply with the Foundation's nondiscrimination policy

- Project information
 - Work plan
 - Innovation (Public Benefit)
 - Regional cooperation (Awareness)
 - Budget and financials
 - Site visit availability
- Interim report (2018 grantees only)



Budget and Matching Funds

Strong proposals will have diverse funding sources with at least a 1:1 match, including:

- Project-related expenses
- In-kind donations
- Volunteer resources



Review process

Application Internal review Committee review Site visits Final decisions

Primary scoring criteria:

- 1. Project's contribution to conservation goals
- 2. Community benefits, particularly for historically underrepresented communities
- 3. Innovative approaches
- 4. Resources and feasibility of implementation
